ROB FAISANT

FOUNDING MEMBER - 1950

A BOND FOR ETERNITY

“The jacket that began a 50+ year friendship. Also to the right: The patch with greater meaning than words can express. If tempted, one could only define its meaning to the special feeling which overwhelms the soul when blasting through fresh powder, that’s what seeing this patch meant/means.”

I walked up to this guy at the bar who was sporting a vintage Vandal Ski Club windbreaker and introduced myself. I learned that he was more than just a Vandal, he was a Delta Sig! And he had the correct response when I confirmed if he had really been a sailor! As we reminisced, he turned out to be much more than just a Sailor! Rob had been a prime mover (likely THE prime mover) in founding Gamma Iota in 1950! This scene was at the end of a hard day on the Alpine Meadows Volunteer Ski Patrol in 1972 shortly after I transferred in from Killington, Vt.

FAST REWIND A COUPLE OF DECADES: THE LAUNCH OF GAMMA IOTA

Rob started at the U of I in 1948; he was President of the Independent Caucus political party (for dorm dwellers) in 1949 when Frank Lloyd, a Delta Sig National field rep knocked on his door and talked with him about fraternity life. Rob and his roommate, Bob Vlack, were soon sold and recruited many of their friends, forming the Gamma Iota chapter. The early members were a mixed bag of young students and some older WWII vets, all of whom were short on cash and long on energy! Frank also recruited the first Alumni Control Board (ACB) including Ted Pritchard (dean of Art and Architecture), Elmer Nelson (president of the Idaho First National Bank in Moscow), Eugene Slade (a Finance manager at the U of I) and Frank Young (coach of the boxing team). They were a very committed team who helped the young enthusiasts find, fund, and renovate a former photo studio into their fraternity house. Ted, Elmer, and Eugene were still dedicated to guiding the chapter 15 years later during my era.

A formative event for the new chapter was hiring Jenny (Ma) Morris as cook. She had been working in logging camps and at the U of I Forestry camp in McCall. Ma literally ruled the Gamma Iota kitchen with an iron hand, brandishing dented pots and pans when necessary to remind us how she controlled rowdy loggers. She cared deeply about the members and the success of the chapter, even hounding members who had not paid their fees on time! (I wish I had known that when I was treasurer in 1964). Ma helped us learn discipline and the rewards of hard work peeling potatoes and washing everything. She was a great cook and was loved and respected.

Several of the members back in the day were hunters who kept the meat locker rented downtown stocked with venison and elk, and they wisely pledged an apprentice butcher (Bob Fisher) from New Jersey. One season they bagged 17 deer and several elk!



GAMMA IOTA SKI PATROL-IN ROB’S OWN WORDS:

“Curt Mattson from Connecticut had had some contact there with the newly formed National Ski Patrol. Curt had the idea that we skiers in the house could benefit by forming our own ski patrol. Together we took the American Red Cross Advanced First Aid course. Bud Deerkop built a rescue toboggan (an old “Sun Valley” type with stand-up handles and a unique design hinged-plate harrow-tooth brake on the back) (ed. Note: running a heavy old “Sun Valley” was used as a kind of punishment for patrollers who screwed up at Killington when I was there in 1969-71). We designed our own parka insignia and declared ourselves available to ski areas. Ma Morris hand crafted parka patches, a large white circle containing a large red cross, and sewed them and Vandal Ski Club patches onto our parkas.

We would call a ski area a week or two in advance, ask if they wanted a patrol (most did - there were few regular patrols) and we would drive there on a Friday night. The area would likely provide dinner. We would sleep on the floor of the Lodge, eat bacon and eggs provided by the area that were cooked in the fireplace, and patrol Saturday and Sunday. Fantastic way to ski for free! (A typical trip would be to Chewelah Peak Ski Area, 50 miles North of Spokane (now 49 degrees north and a major ski area).

The patrollers in addition to me were Bud Deerkop, Dudley Homer, Curt Mattson, and several others I can’t remember. While patrolling at Chewelah I asked questions about several avalanches, but got no answers, which triggered my life-long avocation of avalanche work.”

BACK TO THE RECENT PAST: ROB’S LIFETIME COMMITMENT TO SKI SAFELY

Rob was a very skilled ski patroller and an expert in Avalanche prevention and rescue. He was the US National Ski Patrol Avalanche Advisor for several years and knew many of the avalanche greats. In 1983, using his considerable “engineered leadership skills” Rob organized a European Avalanche Seminar leading 52 of us to Davos, Switzerland, and Val D’Isere, France where we learned from the European experts.

At Davos he arranged for us to be hosted by Professor C. Jaccard, Director of the Swiss Federal Institute for Avalanche Research, Dr. Hans

Gubler a leader at the institute, and Herr Nik Kindschi, director of the Parsendienst—the legendary Davos rescue service. Topics included Switzerland’s Avalanche Warning systems and methods to analyze the cohesiveness of the snowpack and its propensity to slide.

At Val D’Isere Rob engaged M. Jean Lou Costerg, Director of Service des Pistes et de la Securite, and Col. Guy de Marliave, Director of the French National Association for the study of Snow and Avalanches to host us. At both Davos and Val D’Isere we were led through very challenging terrain with avalanche hazards, discussed hazard mitigation techniques, and learned from demonstrations of equipment, explosives, and avalanche rescue methods including dogs and helicopters.

ROB’S DAY JOB, HIS LAW CAREER

Upon obtaining his JD from Stanford, Rob practiced on the San Francisco Peninsula until he retired in 2014. He handled mostly business and litigation, then estate planning. He had a very rich and fulfilling career.

Rob was an outstanding estate attorney and prepared bulletproof wills, trusts, and estate plans for my family. He graciously handled estate matters and college funding plans pro bono for the wife and daughter of Bernie Kingery, the Alpine Meadows beloved Mountain Manager who was killed in the enormous 1982 avalanche. Rob also provided legal support pro-bono in several church related matters.

FAST FORWARD BACK TO THE PRESENT

Rob is now fully retired on the San Francisco Peninsula with his wonderful wife, Nancy. He has three married daughters, six married grandchildren, and eight great grandchildren. WOW!

Rob’s takeaways from Delta Sig days: he learned to work cooperatively toward shared goals which helped a lot in life after college. His favorite memories of college days were meals with Ma Morris! He says he remains grateful for Delta Sig and his brothers.

His advice to undergrads: Enjoy this time of life- it is like no other!

Fast forward back to the present

HISTORY

CATCHING THE EYE OF THE ALUMNI

Since the founding of Gamma Iota, one of the chapter's oldest traditions has to be our alumni newsletter, The Gamma Eye. First named and published in the Spring of 1953 by a precocious freshman editor by the name of James Kocher. Despite only being our third year on campus he saw the need and value of informing the alumni on the happenings of the members, alumni, and chapter. The copy we have of that initial publication appears to have been hand typed and probably was mimeographed and then hand stuffed into envelopes and mailed to the alumni.

Some of the highlights from the first edition include:

- Brother Kocher introduced himself and encouraged the alumni to stay in touch and come by the chapter house anytime.
- Alumni Robbie Van Kleek, Wilson Churchman, and Dan Anderson all added daughters to their families.
- Dick Parsons headed off to graduate school in Political Science at Fort Robins, CA.
- Jim Rodgers sent a Christmas gift check to the chapter.
- The chapter bought a used piano for the house. Despite the rough exterior, when played by member Bill Exworthy it produced "very nice tunes."
- The furnace was rehabbed and produce heat like it was brand new and the up stairs hallway was tiled.
- Jim Wright and Dave Womeldorf both pinned their sweethearts. Jim was tubbed

by the pledges and Dave's was still pending at the time of the publication.

- Four pledges were initiated last fall. Bob Speedy was named outstanding pledge.
- Bud Deerkop was President of the Vandal Ski Club and FFA.
- The dates for the National Convention were announced in Estes Park, CO. on Sept. 7-10, 1953 at The Stanley Hotel. Filming location for the Stephen King novel adaptation of The Shining in 1980.

During his tenure as editor, the Gamma Eye was acknowledged at two National Conventions in the mid 50's as one of the best newsletters in the country. Current staff at HQ today made similar comments about our Fall 22' edition. Nice way to honor Jim's legacy.

James Kocher went on to serve as New Member Educator, Treasurer, and President for Gamma Iota. He was integral in reorganizing the rush strategy and helped grow the chapter to 45 members by the time he graduated. Up next was a stint with HQ as a Field Representative and then a teaching job in Las Vegas. He stayed active as an alumnus and helped reorganize the ACB in 1958 as some of the founding alumni stepped down. With all these contributions as a member and alumnus, his most enduring legacy may be that hand typed 3-page newsletter published 70 years ago this spring. Brother Kocher entered the Bond Eternal in 1974.

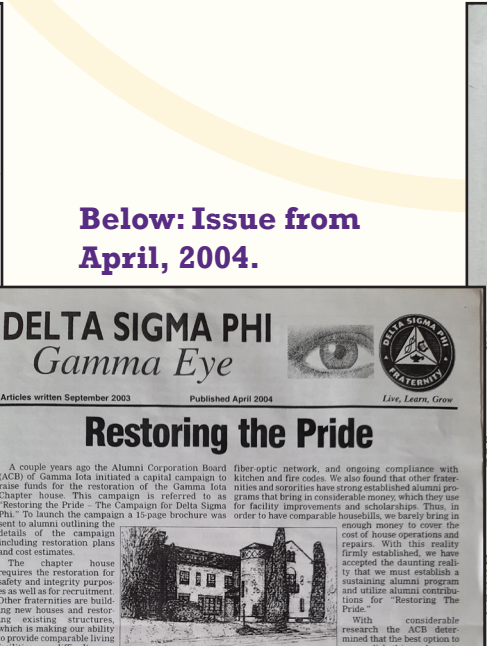

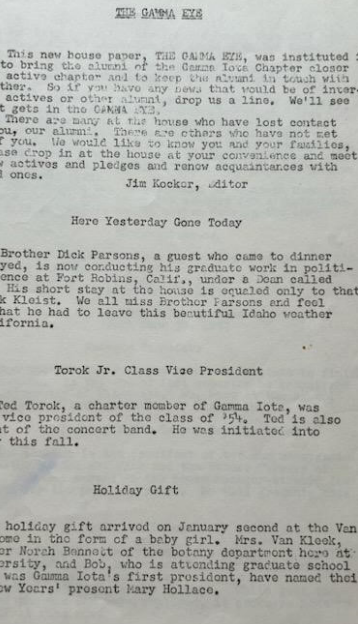

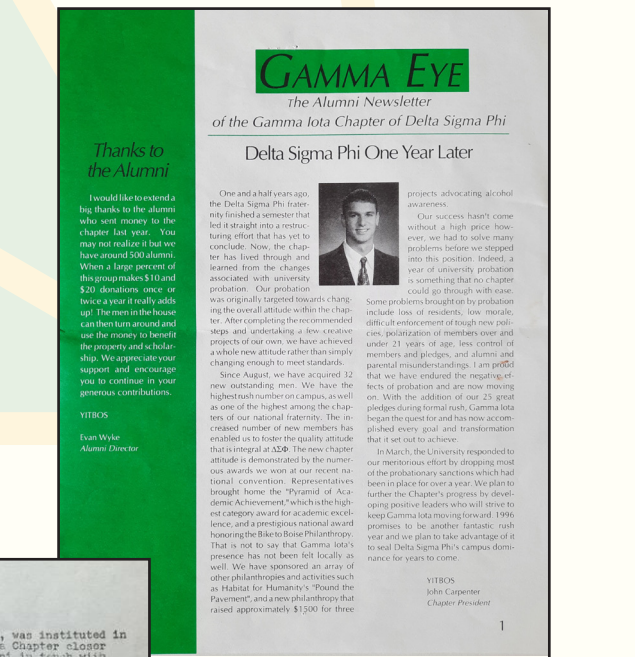

Lynn Marsh was born September 14, 1945 in Spokane, WA. but grew up in Grangeville, ID. His high school pursuits included football, baseball, gymnastics, and band where he sat next to his future wife. He earned his Eagle Scout in 1962. After graduation, Lynn joined Gamma Iota. He married his sweetheart in 1965 and graduated with a B.S. in Education in 1969. His first teaching job was at Burien Jr. High in Seattle. 2 years later he took a position at Cascade High School where he taught math, science, industrial arts and served as the Junior Class Advisor, wrestling coach and volunteer ski coach spanning 18 years. He received a Teacher of the Year while there. Lynn worked for the Valley County Search and Rescue as an advanced EMT and served as a Deacon in his church.

In 1990, they moved to Boise where he taught math for 1 year at Borah High School, then at Meridian Academy where he received the 1992-93 Outstanding Technology Instructor for the state of Idaho. He developed a science and english program with another teacher that was his thesis for a Masters in Education from Boise State in 2000. His final teaching position was at Marion Pritchett High School in Boise.

He loved outdoor activities with family including camping, hiking, rafting, but especially fishing. He entered the bond eternal on May 14, 2023. He is survived by his wife of 58 years, Carol. 2 children, 2 siblings, numerous nieces and nephews and his beloved granddaughter. He left quite a legacy as a husband, father, and educator. RIP Brother Marsh.
