Since joining the Executive Board in mid-March, I've had the honor to work on an extended team of brothers towards building a better future for Gamma Iota. We have a great executive board with eight new eager E-Board officers to build upon the past year of work, and a strong sense of duty. Yet building the brotherhood is a difficult, fulltime job. Without connection to our alumni base, their guidance, mentorship, and their experience, we won't accomplish the vision we've set. E-Board members are taking their roles and development as leaders seriously, learning the ins and outs of each position and working together to find creative solutions to

responsibility so far has consisted of truly understanding the poor financial state of the Chapter, and working to ensure a better future for Gamma Iota; a future where we keep our letters on our beloved Chapter house.

To ensure that better future, our entire Brotherhood is focused on keeping our beloved letters on our Chapter house, by making improvements to our operations, and the physical house for Fall 2016. We contracted for new, efficient commercial laundry equipment to reduce our operating cost, retiring our contract with the Hainsworth Laundry, which was a contract that Gamma Iota had been renewing in five-year periods since the original agreement in 1988. We've also transitioned to a new cooking service to further reduce operating cost in what is one of the largest Chapter costs. Greek House Chefs will debut as our selected cook service during Rush, offering a higher quality of food service than our previous private provider and with less cost, leveraging their size to offer efficiencies. We've cancelled our outdated financial service and have partnered with Legacy Financial (LegFi) with help from our Delta Sig National representative. This streamlined online platform facilitates collecting house bills and online donations for fundraising campaigns. Soon we'll implement a fully automated budget on Legfi, providing improved tracking of our income, expenses, and collecting outstanding member balances. These small changes will add up, but we're also undertaking the larger more complex projects that will improve our ability to recruit new members and gain momentum. This summer we've worked diligently with the Alumni Control Board (ACB) to fundraise for major physical plant remodel projects. We funded a major repair to the sundeck surface through our operating budget (which comes from member house bills). The previous sundeck issues were compounding in the dining room, which has had ongoing

structural issues for years due to poor initial construction and wear and tear. E-Board is excited to announce we'll be contracting the dining room remodel in the following weeks, with an estimated completion before formal Rush in August. A sincere thank you to all of our alumni brothers who have generously donated and invested their money and time; we're humbled that you trust us with your hard-earned resources and still feel a strong connection to the Chapter. Our vision isn't possible without continuity between the active members leading the Chapter, and the continued support of our alumni base.

To ensure our vision continues with leadership change, we've updated the E-Board election and transition process. Providing each brother a solid footing when they succeed us will ultimately provide the brotherhood a stable foundation to continually build upon. Beginning this past semester we elected the first Executive Board under our changed process where elections are held in the fall, and the officers transitioning in the spring. In addition, we're undertaking a detailed documentation process, building handbooks for each E-Board officer position. This was a collective decision of our members to adopt a best practice in use with most fraternities on campus, and one step towards a better future. I am so excited to see what else we can be achieve beyond our accomplishments throughout the past year. We've set high expectations for ourselves for Rush by recruiting a large enough pledge class to continue the Gamma Iota Brotherhood, and fund our future. We're incredibly excited to continue building the bond with our alumni brothers, and to be a part of something bigger, and to not be victims to a few low points in the Chapter's history. Thank you for your continued support!

THE RENO - THE BIG PROJECT A COSMETIC RE-MODEL FOR SUSTAINABILITY OF MEMBERSHIP

We have split the cosmetic improvement projects into four separate packages so that the renovation process can be a bit more manageable and adapted to a long term strategy. The packages and the projects contained within them are ranked in order of their importance, based off of the level of impact that each project would have. All project proposals have been established with frugality being a major factor.

ITEM ONE: THE DINNING ROOOM

WHAT THE UNDERGRAD BROTHERS WILL DO:

- Remove all existing furniture
- Remove all ceiling tiles
- Dispose of all garbage and clean area
- Remove existing Peacocks & Kitchen Doors
- Sand down entire floor
- 40 grit, followed by 120 grit

WHAT THE CONTRACTORS PURPOSED:


- Rewire ceiling for 30 new can lights (LED?)
- Tear out existing casings excluding existing wains coatings
- Refurbish hardwood floor throughout entire room
- Replace both sets of existing hardwood with new S.C. doors
- Doors to kitchen to be spring loaded dual hinge for safety going in and out of kitchen
- Hang, tape, texture new drywall ceiling
- Re-trim and paint
- 2 Custom serving tables: 1 at 14'x3' and 1 at 8'x3' both with drawers for length of tables.
- Deck of tables to be 12"x12" granite with matching wood self-edge

SUMMATION OF ITEM ONE: This is the first item in package one to be completed. This means that the in house members have determined it is the area of the house that needs to be renovated the most. The reason for this is because it is simply the largest eyesore in the house. The leak in the ceiling has caused a lot of the ceiling tiles to rot and fall, and it has caused six of the eight florescent lights to go out. The floors are damaged from traffic, moving tables and chairs, as well as several half-hearted repair attempts. I will try to provide some pictures that do this monstrosity justice.

ITEM TWO: THE BATHROOMS SECOND FLOOR BATHROOM:

WHAT THE CONTRACTORS PURPOSE TO DO:

- Remove Sink, toilet, urinal
- Grind and refloat walls and ceiling
- Texture and paint
- New divider for Urinal



BASEMENT FLOOR BATHROOM:

WHAT THE UNDERGRAD BROTHERS WILL DO:

- Remove Sink
- Remove document Cabinet

WHAT THE CONTRACTORS PURPOSE TO DO:

- Grind walls, re-float imperial coating, texture
- New flooring
- Trim, casings, and baseboard
- New light fixture

SUMMATION OF ITEM TWO: The bathrooms have been grouped together to form the 2nd project in order of importance. The reason behind this is that while other improvement projects in the house can be performed by undergraduates and people without experience in renovation, aspects of this project are beyond the scope of most 18-22 year olds. The condition of our bathrooms is something that cannot be fixed simply by a deep clean. We have had a lot of problems to certain fixtures in the house (i.e. toilets that won't reliably flush, sinks that leak, and faucets with valve issues). The odor in 2nd head is permanent as it comes from cracks in the floor that absorbed overflowing water from the urinal. And we currently don't have doors on the front of the stalls. Basement head has had problems with mold on the wall next to the toilet which can be repaired by grinding and refloating. We have excluded girls head because it is in relatively good condition. We know that having good bathrooms is not a huge attraction for a potential new member but the bathrooms we have now are a huge deterrence.

ITEM THREE: FLOORING Second & Third Floor:

WHAT THE UNDERGRAD BROTHERS WILL DO:

- Remove and dispose of all existing flooring. - Scraping and sanding to our best judgment. - Dispose of waist.
- WHAT THE CONTRACTORS PURPOSE TO DO:

- 4. High Quality Laminate using latex sealing on joints to create water resistance
- 5. New Baseboards
- *** SUGGESTED ***
 - Refinishing the stone flooring in the peacocks through an acid treatment and re-grout.

SUMMATION OF ITEM THREE: This is the 3rd item on the list because poor condition of the carpet in the common areas of the house gives the house an overall dirty feeling. Shampooing the carpets helps but the wear is too severe to restore them to an adequate state. The flooring will be a major component in improving the overall quality of the house.

ITEM FOUR: DOORS & DOORFRAMES

WHAT THE UNDERGRAD BROTHERS WILL DO:

- Remove existing Door, and Dispose of them
- Remove existing messed up door frames
 - Because of continuous fixing door, adjusting location for the hinges, almost all doorframes and trim need to go.

WHAT THE CONTRACTORS PURPOSE TO DO:

- Doing a uniformed and properly trimmed door jamb
- Installing Solid core interior doors to be used

SUMMATION OF ITEM FOUR: This is the 4th item on the list because nearly every door in the house is a different size or has been jammed improperly. The type of door, trim, door handle, and threshold is different for nearly every door in the house which makes replacing them extremely difficult. Hollow core doors would be cheaper, but the ones we installed during work week all have cracks or holes in them now from moving furniture, leaning against them, even shutting/opening them roughly. Missing or broken doors make our home look ragged and in disrepair.

ITEM FIVE: SLEEPING PORCH

- WHAT THE UNDERGRAD BROTHERS WILL DO:
 - Remove all existing furniture on the porch
 - Remove all staples from the floors, walls, and ceiling.
 - Sand down the darken areas on the porch flooring.

WHAT THE CONTRACTORS PURPOSE TO DO:

- Refinishing floors Sanding and sealing
- Install Trim, casings, and baseboards
- Walls will not be refinished, but will be

What the Undergrad Brothers will do:

- Removal of light fixtures, flooring, mirror, stalls, and sink/cabinet

What the Contractors Purpose to do:

- New stalls installed with space underneath to mop and sweep
- New sink and urinal, leaving existing toilets in place
- New single sink, vanity, and flooring



- Remove existing urinal divider

- Finish cleaning up floors, and lay new carpet
- Preferably carpet squares so we can replace worn-out squares in the center without replacing the low trafficked squares on the edges

STAIRS FLOORING:

WHAT THE UNDERGRAD BROTHERS WILL DO:

- Remove all existing flooring, Dispose of it, and scrape and sand below flooring as needed.

WHAT THE CONTRACTORS PURPOSE TO DO:

- New Carpet in turret stairway including landings
- 1st landing in turret stairway to be rebuilt due to water damage *** AFOREMENTIONED ***

- 1. Dining Room Flooring to be refinished
- 2. Bathroom Flooring replaced (2nd, 3rd, and basement)
- 3. Basement

repainted

SUMMATION OF ITEM FIVE: This is the 5th item on our list because a sleeping porch is an area of high scrutiny for freshmen coming in for recruitment. That area serves essentially as the bedroom for freshmen, as well as sophomores. The area is not necessarily in poor condition, but should be refurbished as it is a big selling point to the freshmen.

SIDE NOTE:

Keep in mind that we are not neglecting the house by letting these issues get this bad. A lot of these issues stem from undergrads doing what they could to improve a certain aspect of the house, but lacking the know-how, tools, resources, or funding. With our numbers as low as they are we do not have the funds to repair the house through our own means, which is the reason we have looked to alumni donations to subsidize the process.



The 31 active brothers of Delta Sigma Phi the Gamma Iota chapter were able to raise \$4,250 for the Hope House, before the ceremony. Even more donations came pouring in at the alumni dinner held later in the evening the day of the ceremony, upwards of \$1,600. The


