Into a has pushed the limits yet again. We have begun to remind and remake what it means to be a better man. We raised many questions from within and with outsiders when we were put under investigation for some questionable acts. That was bad, but how we responded was amazing! Within the past year Gamma Iota had some true leaders from the alumni side step forward and take the reins on the Alumni Corporation Board, ACB. We also had some strong individuals shine brighter within the undergraduates, showing us that strength by the brave actions to aid the chapter while it needed the support the

most. We grew a full Alumni Chapter, and made it official by having over a hundred paid members recognized. We created another alumni support body for the undergraduates by creating a Collegiate Chapter Association Board, CCAB, that has been required and needed for years by the national fraternity.

We also reached many necessary milestones to grow as a stronger, structurally sound chapter. By this I mean we updated our 929 men database for our alumni. Collecting emails, addresses, majors, PC's, and social media profiles for many that needed updated. We had 800+ alumni step forward and say enough is enough, and raised over \$93,000 for

the chapter, \$80,000 of which was raised this year in efforts of making our May 2017 fundraising goal. We have begun much needed renovations for the Pyramid, which includes a brand-new roof. All and all, we have had a pretty successful start to a rebranding of the Delta Sigma Phi – Gamma Iota Chapter at the University of Idaho. And we owe it all to the alumni volunteering countless hours in efforts of working side by side with our undergraduate leadership and faculty at the school that has been guiding us to a sanction-less Greek house.

YOUTH UPDATE

Delta Sigs Stronger Then Ever

WHAT THE CURRENT SITUATION IS WITH THE SANCTIONS

🥆 he Gamma Iota Chapter of Delta Sigma Phi has taken several steps since the Fall 2016 academic semester to address the sanctions issues by the Greek Community Stands Board (GCSB) as well as the Alumni Corporation Board (ACB) in a collective effort to improve the culture of the chapter as well as to take responsibility for its actions. With the close collaboration of the ACB, the Collegiate Chapter Advisory Board (CCAB), as well as representatives from the National Fraternity, the chapter has reviewed the status, conduct, and academics of its current active members in an effort to identify problematic behavior that has contributed to an unhealthy culture within the chapter. Several steps were taken post-review in an effort to improve this culture as well as meet the new standards both self-imposed as well as placed upon us by the GCSB and ACB.

The Gamma Iota chapter has abided by the terms of suspensions the University has imposed during the previous academic year, 2016-2017. The required actions were all completed within the timeline established, with the single exception of the Alcohol or Basics Course. This course requires the attendance of the entire chapter, and for the class to be led by the University's Testing and Counseling team, however they were not able to determine a date for the program by the end of the academic year. This final milestone in our sanctions will be completed by the earliest possible date in the Fall Semester of 2017.

As part of the combined sanctions the active members worked to complete a min-

imum of 20 hours of community service, join at least one other club or organization outside of Gamma Iota, and complete the Think About It Course. This course is designed to engage students in actively thinking about situations that may occur on or off campus and use critical thinking to proceed with appropriate actions that limit risk for all. Academically, all current and active members were required to achieve, at minimum, a 2.0 GPA. The members of Gamma Iota exceeded these expectations resulting in a chapter GPA average of above 3.0.

In order to move forward as a chapter, members submitted themselves to reviews by the national risk manager, Cameron Warner, as well as the ACB. As a result of these reviews, three classifications of membership were established. Active, Deferred Membership Suspension, and Full Membership Suspension. Deferred members are required to complete their sanctions and then proceed to petition to become Actives, while Full Membership Suspension meant that their status was not reviewable until 2020. These classifications were established to limit the risk against the chapter as well as to further establish a stronger culture by the members who did not receive suspen-

The current chapter president, Jonathan Shields, continued to meet with the Dean of Students and other representatives on campus to help lead the charge forward, ensuring a healthy change in culture which kept the members looking forward. The suspension was lifted by the University at the end of school year with the understanding

that all returning members and new pledges complete the Alcohol Basics and Choices course this fall. After submitting our summer rush plan to the Dean and Greek Adviser, we were approved to participate in summer rush as a fully recognized fraternity by the University. Our chapter will remain on probation until the end of 2020.

A LETTER FROM THE CHAPTER PRESIDENT



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SAILORS SPOTLIGHT

IVER J. LONGETEIG

Iver J. Longeteig is the proverbial Son of Idaho. He was born in Potlatch on April 7, 1941 where his father was a school teacher. At the age of one his family moved to Craigmont to help run the family farm that his grandfather owned. It was an idyllic rural Idaho life where kids could run free and use their imagination to have fun and entertain themselves. Not to mention. learn a strong lifelong work ethic.

"J" was one of fifteen in his graduating class. A large one for Craigmont in those days. There was never a question as to where "J" would attend college. His maternal grandfather, mother, father, three sisters, four uncles and his son, Andrew are all proud alumni of the University of Idaho. His grandfather's advice when he left for Moscow." Don't let your classes interfere with your college education".

He was a houseguest during rush where most of the men from Craigmont had pledged and became members including John Clovis 56', his big brother. Other fine men included pledge brothers Dick Petersen, Bill Fischer, Eldon Fedler, Fred Fricke and members Dick Leoppky 56' and Karl Bittenbender 56' just to name a few. He was coeditor of the Gamma Eye for a couple of years and his pledge brother, Paul Stewart called him the "Social Chairman before we even had one". Many of the men during his time in the house he continues to hold friendships to this day. He attends a monthly Delta Sig coffee in Boise with regulars John Beckwith 57', Ted Boam 59', Steve Arnt 60', Paul Jauregui 59', Dick Slaughter 62', Sam White 57, Jerry Timm 60', and Larry Gardner 57'.

"J" began his academic career at Idaho as a PreMed major. He soon realized that chemistry and other life science classes were not for him and changed his major to Political Science. He describes the change in majors this way, "I soon discovered that chemistry tests only had one right answer per question, while in Political Science you could adopt almost any answer and argue your way to success in an essay test."

After graduating with a degree in Political Science he was accepted to the University of Idaho School of Law where he excelled not only as a student but as a leader by being named to the Law Review (top ten percent of his class) and was elected President of the Bench and Bar (law school student body).

Upon graduation from Law School he accepted a position with the most respected law firm in the State of Idaho. He left the firm after four years successful years. When the senior partner asked him why he

was leaving, Iver quipped, "I love the firm, but I had figured out that if I were to get a leadership position, I would have to attend too many expensive funerals." The senior partner laughed and wished him well.

He set up a solo practice in Meridian for the next few years then established a two man practice in Boise with John Runft. That soon became a six person firm. He says the highlight of his legal career was when he put Walter Cronkite on hold for 30 minutes and he was still there when he

After many years he left the practice to become House Counsel for a client in Las Vegas, Nevada. After three years there he returned to Idaho to establish the solo practice he maintains today.

I got to know Iver J. Longeteig as an undergraduate. I was sitting on the front porch with some of the Brothers one afternoon when this man walks up and introduces himself and tells us he is an alumni. Of course, we were thrilled to meet him, especially since we did not have an alumni association, only a few alumni who kept in touch. "J" was in town on business as he was suing the University of Idaho for a client. He told great stories but to a bunch of college undergraduates just as impressive was he bought the beer! Whenever he was in Moscow he always stopped by

the chapter which we cherished. I can testify first hand that when I was in Boise you were always welcomed into "J's" law firm's office without announcement and no matter how busy he was he made time to invite you in for a personal conversation. He did not ask questions about the chapter to entertain us, but because he cared. Over the vast years and miles since my graduation I have never forgotten Iver J. Longeteig and the positive impression he left with me not only as fine man, but as finer fraternity brother. When I decided to become actively involved in helping our beloved Gamma Iota the first thing I told Eric Pickett is we need to reach out to "J." We did, and without missing a beat he was all in. "J" lives in Boise with his wife Chase. He has two adult children, Andrew and Halle and a granddaughter Leila.

"J" says of Gamma Iota, "Delta Sigma Phi meant a lot to me, as an undergraduate, grad school member, and as an alumnus. I feel that the fraternity has always tried and usually succeeded in doing the right thing, and I am proud to call myself a member." Iver "J" Longeteig, I am so proud to call you my and our Brother.
