"I have had the good fortune of meeting all the artists on my bucket list, and I am pleased to report that 99% of them are wonderful people". His two favorites are Sir Paul McCartney and David Grohl. He says of them, "Two of the nicest people you will ever meet". Especially since Sir Paul was kind enough to sing happy birthday to Kristine backstage for her 50th. With all of his success and interaction with the affluent and famous, he has not forgotten where he came from. He credits that to his family and time on campus. "My experiences at The University of Idaho instilled in me the value of staying grounded and keeping what is important in life always in mind". He also knows the importance of giving back. These are some of his philanthropic efforts he is most proud of. Serves on the industry advisory board for the City of Hope Hospital and Cancer Research Center where he has been instrumental in raising millions of dollars for breast cancer research. Founding board member of the Naval Special Warfare Family Foundation which funds programs for families of Navy SEALS who are on missions or have been injured or killed in action. Former board chairman for Professional Beauty Association which serves the interests of US manufacturers, distributors, and salon owners. Past chairman of the San Diego Chapter of the Young President's Organization, a global organization of company presidents and CEO's for shared learning. He has also financially supported the chapter the last two years to help revive the Old Castle.

When asked if he had any advice for the current undergraduates he said the following. "Master the art of effective communication, put yourself out there, always find ways to help others, and view life through the adventure lens. Doing these four things will dramatically increase the odds of success, not just economic success, but success in life" It has been 37 years since I met Brother Heffner and I always knew he would do well. He joins a long list of Gamma Iota alumni that have succeeded in all facets of life and I am proud to call him a fraternity brother. His one last bit of advice for anyone is my favorite. "It really breaks down into two words...be nice! It's just that simple.

Insurance and eventual costly damage forces us to get this done sooner than later. Which is in pretty good shape for the most part and only needs cared for to keep up it's integrity.

It's been a great year of progress made possible by alumni donations of time and treasure. However, we have a long way to go brothers. The entire electrical system is completely suspect. We have to finish each and every room in the house along with the remaining items in the heads, shower and advisors quarters. We need closets built in every single room as the old ones were nearly 50 years old according to some magazine and calendar found in the Corner Club. We need to modernize with appropriate materials, fixtures and locks. All new flooring is needed in every square foot of the house, except the dining room. The exterior of the house has not been touched for a decade. We really can't do much to the brick other than care for it, but the siding and exterior paint is in complete disarray. The old brick fence needs to come down as it cannot be repaired to the satisfaction of the county or our insurance providers. Retaining walls along

the sidewalk, driveway, alley stairs and dining room all need to be reworked. The list goes on and on and we will continue to need man and wallet power of each and every member of Gamma Iota to keep the dream alive and turn the clock back on the old girl. ur goal in rebuilding the chapter began recruiting the right men, who will uphold the new culture we establish. We successfully grew from a 4-man E-board, to 10 men using a selective process in collaboration with ACB. Under our newly established risk management and academic polices, as well as a new pledging procedure shaped in collaboration with nationals, the chapter established new membership criteria such as: mandatory club and campus involvement, mandatory committee positions within the chapter, and each man performing 10 volunteer hours per semester.

These new procedures were designed to demonstrate Delta Sig's ability to move-on from a toxic culture, and reassert itself as an organization that benefits the community and contributes to the growth of its college men. With enough manpower to maintain chapter functions we looked to the outwardly, and began our efforts to re-establish the Delta Sig's active status in the wake of our suspension.

We are also working to adopt a street inside the city of Moscow, and create a Sock-drive to benefit homeless shelters. We hope the culmination of all these events will set the tone to the campus that Delta Sig is rebuilding, in a better direction than ever before.

Six-months-ago, I compared our recent

history to that of a forest fire, and as an opportunity to build anew. I am proud to say that we have done just that, without having to lose everything. As with any pledge class it is important to strengthen the bond between the individuals pledging and the chapter. With the backing of our alumni we've managed to persevere despite numerous setbacks, and an important part of that was keeping our chapter facility. The pyramid still stands as the bastion of our Brotherhood, for both undergraduates and Alumni and for that we are eternally grateful. To show our appreciation we have engaged in our own work parties, restoring the kitchen, building a new sign for the corner and installing a new sliding glass door.

We, the undergraduate chapter, are eagerly looking to the future and spearheading a campus-wide culture change. We wish to thank the Alumni for their confidence, generosity and passion in this process. ttending Leadership Institute was one of the most beneficial and memorable time thus far as a Delta Sig, of course nothing beats initiation though. After the lengthy travel session to get there, which was helped by the fact that I was flying with a brother from Utah, we checked into our hotel at four o'clock in the morning only to get up a very short while later to meet the rest of the brothers back at the airport. I had no idea what to expect when I got there. When we met up with the fifty other brothers from across the nation I had the same thought on my mind as everyone else there, these guys probably think they're all top dog, this is going to be a lot of egos under one roof, we're not going to learn anything new--we could not have been more wrong.

We spent time learning just what our leadership style is, and how to utilize them in the most effective ways. We developed an understanding of the values we hold most dear to ourselves and learned that sometimes mistakes are crucial for progress. The speakers gave important lessons; found the weak links and so we could encourage and build them, know when to lead, listen, and when to act. Perhaps most importantly we discovered that as individuals we are weak, as a chapter we are strong, but as a fraternity, we are powerful.

The Team Obstacle Course, the 3-Man Climbing Wall, and Jacob's Ladder were all intensive physical exercises that could only be accomplished when we worked as brothers and utilized our individual skill sets.

There were several times of serious self-reflection that allowed us to more comprehend just what we were learning in just short amounts of time. We reflected on our core values and how they align with our chapters and the national organization. We shared with each other what we stood for, what our beliefs were and what brings us down. We shared our passions and our adversities. This opening up came full force near the programs end. The bonfire showed that the guy you thought was just a meat head and full of ego, actually worried about the same body image issues you do. We saw how some people go through their entire life hiding secrets, but being surrounded by the brotherhood of Delta Sig, that maybe it wasn't so bad to come out and open up.

This program was nothing like any of the numerous leadership retreats, programs, or exercises I have ever attended. We came doubting we would leave as friends. We all heard the warning that we'd leave willing to fly across the nation just to attend eaceah other's weddings, and they were right.
